

Reflections from the Rectory

It is a constant refrain of clergy, which some of you may find rather tiresome, that we have lost any understanding of Advent. In the western church, the four Sundays before Christmas herald the Advent season and traditionally this has been a time for fasting, repentance and preparation for the coming of Jesus. It is not just a remembrance of the first Christmas but a preparation for the coming of Jesus into the world a second time. Time to examine our consciences and wait patiently for the Lord.

These days we are often overcome by Christmas celebrations before Advent has even begun; this year on the 1st December. By the time we get to Christmas we are frequently exhausted and Christmas Day seems the end of the festive season rather than the beginning. Because we have lost any sense of the Twelve Days of Christmas we fail to see Epiphany as the end of the festive season and do appreciate what that means either. It is probably too much to hope that we will return to this state of affairs but it is worth remembering that it is at the root of our Christian faith.

In the hope that we will time find time to reflect once again, I have organised three sessions of evening prayer during Advent which are a quiet time for reflection and prayer. We will follow the order of the Book of Common Prayer and the

services will only last for about 25 to 30 minutes. In addition to that this year we are organising a service of Advent carols. This is something I have hoped to do for some years and I'm delighted that with the support of some singers from the Pegasus choir and our own choir this service will be taking place on Sunday, the 1st of December at 6pm in St Thomas's.

Like a Christmas Carol Service, it is a series of readings, some of them very short, interspersed with Advent hymns and opening with the wonderful Matin Responsory as we process into a darkened church with a lighted candle.

For obvious reasons and long before the advent of Christianity light was an important aspect of any kind of ritual celebrated at this time of year. The Christmas reading from St John's gospel reminds us of this,

What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

It is the hope that this Advent service will be an opportunity for quiet reflection on the message of Christmas before we are overcome by the maelstrom of celebration. This year give yourselves a moment to be still and wait for the Lord.

The Lord Warden comes to Winchelsea

Hard on his installation as Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, Sir George Zambellas, with Lady Zambellas, came to Winchelsea, meeting members of the Corporation past and present, visiting the Museum and exploring the town.

The mayor presented him with a print of HMS Winchelsea, the seventh and most recent naval vessel the carry the name, which was built in 1917 and remained in service until the end of the Second World War.



In a subsequent letter to the mayor, the Lord Warden wrote.

Lighting and Sound Appeal Launch

The Rector writes: On the 15th November there was a launch of the lighting and sound appeal in St Thomas's. Over 40 people attended and heard about the plans and were able to ask questions. Since then there has been excellent coverage in the Rye news, thanks to Natasha Robinson: ryenews.org.uk We still have not received formal permission but the Diocese Advisory Council is well aware of the plans and supportive of them.

Nigel Ashton explained the importance of this project and Graham Large showed us specimen light fittings and explained how the new lighting would work. We are enormously grateful to him for sharing his expertise and designing the scheme.

Our lighting is currently supplied by high-level sodium lights which are expensive to run, are now redundant and cannot be replaced as well as casting an unpleasant yellow light which does not do justice to the atmosphere of the beautiful space which is our church and responsibility.

In addition to the running costs, the wiring is now in need of replacement and there is no circuit breaker in place. New lighting will enhance the atmosphere for worship and for concerts. It will also be cheaper to run and better for the environment.

The sound system has not been replaced for many years and is now not fit for purpose. A new system will enable those hard of hearing to engage fully with services by means of a loop. We will also be able to install a system for live streaming services to any part of the world. All this will make our church a more sympathetic place for worship, a more attractive place for those wishing to host concerts as well as reducing our carbon footprint as far as we can.

The church have substantial funds from the sale of St Richard's which could be used to help underwrite the work, however as it very expensive to maintain our church and its ministry but the appeal is designed to attract specific support for the project.

The PCC are hopeful that this essential work will be supported by the Friends of St Thomas's Church who are committed "to arouse and foster interest in the Parish Church at Winchelsea among all persons of goodwill and to co-operate with the Parochial Church Council in the preservation and improvement of the fabric furniture, stained glass and monuments of the Church of St Thomas and the Churchyard thereof, and in furthering any other scheme to help in maintaining their safety, beauty and utility."

The Churchyard in Autumn

The picture shows a group of Pink Ballerina Waxcap Fungi which appeared in the southwest section again this year. These fungi are indicators of a healthy ecosystem in grassland and there have been quite a few on the back of the hill overlooking the Brede Valley too.

Following a meeting earlier in the year, we decided to plant some spring and early summer bulbs, principally in the wildflower circles, to provide nectar for early pollinators when other sources are less abundant. We have chosen native species where possible, such as narcissus pseudonarcissus, but the range of bulbs reflects our thoughts about the needs of bees and insects and, as part of that ecosystem, the Winchelsea swifts. We hope you enjoy them.

Many of you have commented on the improvements in the appearance of the Garden of Remembrance. The old dead box hedge was removed due to blight and is about to be replanted with a lovely green and silver variegated Euonymus. Shrubs have been pruned and new herbaceous perennials, small shrubs and bulbs have been added.

There is still work to be done in our efforts to make the centre space in the Town a place of beauty, peace, reflection and inspiration and perhaps, whilst musing on the past, we should also be looking forward and recognising small ways that we can help our environment for the benefit of all.

On a more personal note, I have really enjoyed working on the Wildflower Circles Project and it could not have been so successful without the enthusiasm and assistance of such a collaborative team. It was great that when we cut the hay this summer there were new people who wanted to get involved too and I hope that a new group of people will band together to carry on this project. Restoring the Crib

Ant Parker is here restoring the figure of Mary that will appear in the Crib at St Thomas's this Christmas.

Our set is one of a series that have their origins about 100 years ago. They are the creation of one of the sisters (and later Mother General) of the Convent of St Mary in Wantage. Before she joined the order, Sister Maribel trained at the Slade, travelled widely in Italy, attended the Oberammergau Passion play and was introduced to Austrian carving.

Soon after she arrived, a clumsy sister dropped and broke the figure of the Christ-child of the Sisters' Christmas crib. Maribel was asked to make another. Instead of making a sweet conventional baby she used her brother's newly born baby son as her model. Jesus was modelled from a real and much-loved baby child. The other figures followed, very much of their time; Jesus and Mary have a White European rather than a Middle Eastern aspect.

Sets went all over the world and a large-scale version is still in use at St Paul's Cathedral. St Thomas's has a reasonably complete group of figures, though it may be that some sheep have strayed. Mother Maribel died at the age of 83, in 1970.



Christmas Windows light up on 14th Saturday 14th December

More journeys on the Marshlink

John Spencer writes: Some stats from the government Office of Rail and Road on station and rail usage on the Marshlink may be of interest to residents. They show that, for Three Oaks and Winchelsea, the change from a two hourly timetable to an hourly one has helped create more journeys on the railway, just as we predicted. Maybe car parking has helped too.

The good news is that every station on the line reported an increase in the year to March 2024. Overall usage was up by 8%. Thank you to everyone who has helped to encourage train travel on the Marshlink line with the associated benefits that brings for people, communities, businesses and the environment.

The summary shows:

Estimated usage is up at all nine stations on the line (Hastings to Ashford International)

Overall 8% rise in estimated station usage on Marshlink line between April 2023 and March 2024 compared with the year before

Overall station usage on Marshlink now at 86.7% of pre-Covid levels

Use of Three Oaks and Winchelsea stations is now above pre-Covid levels and at the highest level since these records began in 1997-1998

Large percentage rise in estimated use of Doleham station although it remains the least-used station in the South East

Line Chair, Kevin Boorman, commented: "These figures are fantastic for the Marshlink, and show just how important the line is, both to visitors and the local community. Passenger numbers have increased at every single station along the line, from 6% at Rye, which now sees almost 460,000 passenger journeys a year, to 89% at Doleham, despite the latter only having a handful of trains a day.

"Particularly noteworthy is the increase at Three Oaks. The railway is the only public transport serving the village, and it's great to see that passenger numbers in 2023/24 rose by 22% to 14,938, the highest usage of this station since these records began over 25 years ago. Winchelsea similarly recorded a large increase, of 18% to 14,196 passengers a year.

"The Community Rail Partnership, with other groups, campaigned hard, and successfully, for reinstatement of an hourly service to these two stations some years ago after they had been cut. It is really encouraging to see that this increase in service has driven demand for the train, as we had hoped it would.

"Community rail is all about getting local people to use and enjoy their local train service, and these figures show just what this means in practice. With continued investment in the line, we hope to see passenger numbers grow even more into the future."

All of the above will be washed down with mulled wine. Once the formalities are out of the way, we can sit back and relax into Christmas.





The 'Anne' Gun Project

You may already have seen the posters around town about the Anne Gun project and, of course, you've probably seen the gun in the museum garden, although it is often partly covered by a hydrangea.

Now FOAM is working with the Museum and Icklesham Parish Council to display it properly. The plan is to restore the barrel and mount it on a historically accurate carriage, made from elm and hand wrought iron. Similar to the illustration above. We want to do this by next summer, so that we can celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Museum.

All this will cost several thousand pounds to achieve, the Parish Council and Corporation have both pledged money and so has FOAM, but it's not quite enough, so we will inevitably need to do some fundraising.

Our first event is a talk about the Anne, in the Church on Saturday 7th December at 7pm. Speaking will be Richard Endsor, an engineer and artist, who has written a book on the Anne. And JD Davies, a prolific author who has written several books about the 17th century navy, and also a best-selling series of historical naval fiction, set in the restoration period, 'The Journals of Matthew Quinton'.

They are very entertaining and it will be a great opportunity to find out some more about the Anne's fascinating story and her importance in naval history and to the local area. Richard is even bringing some artifacts from the Anne for us to examine.

Tickets are £10 and all money will go towards the project. They can be purchased online at $\underline{ticketsource.co.uk}$

The story of the Anne is a fascinating one. In 1690, after being badly damaged during the Battle of Beachy Head, she was deliberately run aground and burnt by her Captain, John Tyrrell, to prevent the French taking her as a prize. Today her lower timbers remain preserved in the mud at Pett Level, where they can be occasionally glimpsed during very low tides. What is believed to be the only remaining gun from the Anne, now lies in Winchelsea, although how it got there is a bit of a mystery.

It wasn't long after her wrecking that work began to retrieve her guns. Teams of horses were used to drag the guns up the beach, and then transport them on wagons to Winchelsea, where they were examined and tested, and those that were in good condition deployed to other ships.

It seems that one gun remained in the area. Charles Trollope, an expert on these matters, has identified the gun as a Saker. The Anne carried 14 of these guns, which were all cast in Sweden. There is evidence that it has been buried upright. Charles speculates that, having failed testing, the gun may have been used as a pivot to support another gun, on a battery that was constructed on Winchelsea Beach.

Winchelsea Residents Association

Annual General Meeting We had a good turnout with over 50 residents in the New Hall. Our new Chair, Glen Marks gave the Chairs Report giving particular thanks to the hard work of committee members who have now stood down and to our new members. He encouraged any resident, particularly those with IT and communications experience to join the Committee. The main attraction was our new MP, Helena Dollimore who spoke on local issues, notably the need for better rail services and her support for introducing safer traffic measures in and around Winchelsea. Helena also answered questions from the audience. WRA is very grateful for her attendance and support. Individual Committee members gave updates on activity through the year which are summarised below.

Committee membership Glen Marks is our new Chair, David Dickson, Secretary and Ian Menzies, Treasurer. Julie Gurr has joined the committee with a role in progressing new traffic measures and Dave Richards to support our IT and communications. The details of the full committee can be found on our website

Finance The 2023/24 Accounts were approved. We confirmed our current bank balance of £1,173 and the savings achieved by changing our website arrangements.

We asked members present to vote on reinstating our membership subscriptions from April 2025, the cost to remain at £10 per member. This was approved. The funds will support printing and publication of material on both A259 and Winchelsea Town traffic, cover our communication and IT costs and provide a modest contingency fund. Requests for payment will be sent out in March 2025.

Traffic The Black Cat monitors provided by Icklesham Parish Council are regularly placed at different locations in the Town and the A259, giving consistent data on speed and numbers of vehicles. It shows an average of 14000 vehicles passing through the Town every week, an increase of 16% compared to last year. WRA highlighted the lack of action from IPC and East Sussex County Council (ESCC). WRA has now made direct contact with National Highways. This has been positive, and we are now waiting for a response from ESCC. If they are supportive, WRA will begin a consultation process with local residents.


WRA continues to support improved safety on the A259. We have compiled a leaflet highlighting the 'hot spots' and how we consider they can be improved. This will be sent to national agencies including National Highways, ESCC and Rother DC. We recognise the local geography limits options, but we cannot ignore the dangers of crossing Tanyard Lane and accessing the New Hall.

Toilets This remains a live issue between Icklesham Parish Council and Rother District Council. We are waiting for the outcome of yet another survey. In the meantime, WRA has offered information on options for a new non-traditional structure on the current site and will continue to press for a long-term solution. The Town is a tourist destination and needs good standard facilities.

Accessible pavements Rother DC has completed the dropped kerbs at all locations and particular thanks to Ali Casey who made sure the works went ahead.



Muse of Metroland

An enthralled Lit Soc tuned into Peter Southgate's account of the Troubadour of Suburbia's biography. Describing a varied and productive life, Peter introduced Betjeman with the poem *Executive*, neatly skewering that rapidly proliferating 1960s novelty and his fetish for soundbites and buzzwords plus his expense account and firm's car (a Cortina).

The audience learnt that whimsy, satire and nostalgia were Betjeman's basic ingredients along with a sense of place embracing counties in several *Shell* travel guides, underground stations like Ruislip Gardens and even private addresses, 189 Cadogan Square! *Middlesex* lamented the remorseless encroachment of Metroland onto that county's rural landscape all personified in a notional symbol, whimsically christened Elaine, accoutred in now long forgotten brands.

Boarding at Oxford's Dragon School and Marlborough bequeathed a lifelong aversion to compulsory games, beatings and bullying while Magdalen College, Oxford sharpened the sense of social inferiority arising from his family being "in trade". He did mingle with Evelyn Waugh, Osbert Lancaster and Cecil Beaton and the don, Maurice Bowra, considered him talented; thereby diverging sharply from John's tutor, C. S. Lewis's, assessment.

Although John went down after 2 years without graduating, his teddy bear, Archibald, left his own literary legacy in Aloysius, Sebastian Flyte's companion in Waugh's *Brideshead Revisited*.


The evocative *Death in Leamington* brought pathos to the melancholy nursing home end of an elderly lady, fated to fade out gently in a faded spa town but confirming the author as "a sensitive versifier".

Becoming Assistant Editor of *The Architectural Review* wove another thread into Betjeman's cultural tapestry, highlighted by his second book, *Ghastly Good Taste*, emblematic of his later take on the built environment. He became a campaigner for our Georgian and Victorian architectural heritage scoring a notable success with the rescue of St. Pancras station but failing to preserve Euston's Arch.

As for *Loves*, John played the field – pledging his troth to five women including one "double booking" before marrying Penelope Chetwode, the daughter of a horrified Field Marshall. Their stormy marriage produced two children and Penelope's extreme equine enthusiasms made her horse a permanent house guest. Their shared High Anglican bond fractured when Penelope embraced Roman Catholicism in 1948, and *Christmas* displays the poet's personal faith oscillating between doubt and affirmation.

Betjeman found solace with Elizabeth Cavendish, a daughter of the Duke of Devonshire and 20 years younger, who became his mistress sharing their *pied-à-terre* in Smithfield's Cloth Market. John's existence now comprised a trinity of married, mistress and bachelor life.

Betjeman experienced a creatively barren tenure as Poet Laureate from 1972 until his death in 1984. Previous campaigns on his behalf were scotched by advisors who dismissed him as a songster of tennis lawns and cathedrals although his supporters held that he lyricised everyday life for everyday people. 

Winchelsea Archaeological Society

A talk will be held in the New Hall, Winchelsea on Saturday 14th December. Coffee and biscuits from 11am. Talk starts at 11.15am.

Andrew Scott will discuss, *Does the Roman Road identified* in Icklesham in 1982 extend eastwards towards Winchelsea?.

The WAS Walk on 10th August viewed the Roman bloomery site at Icklesham, and the site where excavations by the Hastings and Area Archaeological Research Group (HAARG) in 1981/82 discovered a considerable Roman Road.

The talk will focus on LIDAR data, often used to identify the presence of Roman roads in the UK, which will be shown to demonstrate the value of such data; An explanation of how Roman roads were built; Other research data and theories, that might support a Roman presence to the east of Icklesham; LIDAR data of the Icklesham ridge will then be shown.

Following this talk, an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Society will be held. There will be two items of business,

associated with revision of the constitution; this is necessitated by a need for clarification:

- 1. That the Name of the charity should be changed to the "Winchelsea and Area Archaeological and Historical Society" (WAAHS).
- 2. The words 'Area' and 'Historical' are additions to the name to demonstrate that understanding of Winchelsea's history only comes from appreciation of the whole geographic environment in which the town has existed, as exemplified in the talk.
- 3. That the Objectives of the charity be updated to reflect the change of name.
- 4. These amendments to the Constitution must be passed by not less than two thirds of the members present and voting at a general meeting.

The Annual General Meeting of the Society will take place on Saturday 15th February 2025






